CLARB LICENSURE CHANGES

As of January 1, 2024, the Landscape Architecture Registration Examination (LARE) has been reformatted to better align with the areas of practice around which the exam is structured. The new exam is organized to test the candidates' knowledge in four sections, which can now be taken in any order:

- » Inventory, Analysis, and Project Management
- » Planning and Design
- » Construction Documentation and Administration
- » Grading, Drainage, and Stormwater Management

The reorganization of the exam followed a multi-year assessment of landscape architecture practice in the United States and Canada and reflects efforts by CLARB and ASLA to address changes in practice tasks and other pertinent issues facing practitioners including climate change, public health, environmental resiliency, and evolving design & materials science. California offers several pathways to qualify for examination and professional licensure. For the most up-to-date requirements, please refer to LATC's website: <u>https://www.</u> <u>latc.ca.gov/candidates/</u>. Once the LARE is completed, candidates will also have to take and pass the California Supplemental Exam (CSE). Information regarding the CSE can be found on the same website.

Upcoming LARE cycles include:

- » April 2024 (April 1-17, 2024)
- » August 2024 (July 29-August 14, 2024)
- » December 2024 (December 2-18, 2024)

How did many of you find out about the profession of landscape architecture in college or thereafter? I have

felt for many years that our biggest challenge is to increase our visibility as a profession. ASLA National has several programs that they have instituted or are participating in that provide exposure to younger generations.

The Future City Competition is a program started by DiscoverE, a nonprofit organization dedicated to providing global resources, programs, and connections between K-12 students and STEM professionals. This program is open to sixth, seventh, and eighth grade students around the world, the Future City Competition starts with a question – "How can we make the world a better place?"

The 32nd annual Future City Competition was held from September 2023 through February 2024. This year's Future City challenge was to design a 100% electrically powered city with energy generated from sources that keep their citizens and the environment healthy and safe.

Teams are responsible for producing five deliverables:

- » A Project Plan where students complete a four-part plan to help them organize their project,
- » A City Essay in which teams have 1,500 words to describe their futuristic city and solutions to the Climate Change challenge,

- » A City Model with only a \$100 budget, teams creatively repurpose recycled materials to build a scale model of their city,
- » A City Presentation and Q&A session where teams have up to seven minutes to present their city.

Competition finals of nationwide regional winners were held during Engineer's week - February 18 to 20, 2024. On Sunday, February 18, competing teams were judged from STEM and industry partners, including ASLA members Chloe Gillespie, Associate ASLA; Joseph Imamura, ASLA; and Kal Almo, ASLA.

As the first and only design group represented in the STEM competition, the **ASLA Special Award for Nature-Powered Solutions for Design and Equity** went to the Glen Hills Middle School in Glendale, Wisconsin. The team of 14 members won for their creative and futuristic design of their future city.

This is one of many programs ASLA National is promoting to get the word out about our profession! I would love to hear your thoughts on all things related to landscape architecture.

BIODIVERSITY IN OUR BACKYARDS AND BEYOND

The winter rains have stirred our native plants from their dormancy, and now they burst forth with vibrant foliage and stunning floral displays. Spring invites us to rediscover the splendor of our native flora and marvel at the biodiversity within our local plant communities. I urge our members to immerse themselves in nature for inspiration and rejuvenation. Moreover, if you have the means or can volunteer your time, consider cultivating something, even soil. Take a patch of earth under your care and witness the diversity of life you can create below grade. Getting dirty is cleansing.

As we continue to navigate the ever-evolving challenges posed by climate change, it's crucial to emphasize the role of Landscape Architects not only as designers but as stewards of the environment. ASLA has set clear goals for global biodiversity, committing to advancing <u>the global movement to</u> <u>protect and restore at least 30 percent of terrestrial, coastal,</u> <u>and marine ecosystems by 2030 (30 x 2030).</u> To address the biodiversity crisis, the ASLA Climate Action Committee has been rebranded as the ASLA Climate and Biodiversity Action Committee (BCAC). Additionally, the ASLA Fund recently published new <u>peer-reviewed research</u> by Dr. Sohyun Park, ASLA, PhD, focusing on landscape architecture solutions to the biodiversity crisis. Dr. Park's research underscores the remarkable efficacy of landscape architecture strategies in enhancing biodiversity. These strategies include incorporating native plants, supporting pollinators, conserving natural habitats, transforming gray infrastructure with green-blue solutions, and engaging in participatory design processes to forge partnerships with stakeholders and stewards. Dr. Park's findings align with the themes covered in **SDASLA CAC's February webinar on the Miyawaki Method of Afforestation,** highlighting how small wooded lots can bolster regional biodiversity by reducing ecosystem fragmentation.

Lastly, I'd like to highlight that ASLA BCAC is offering a 9-part webinar series titled <u>"ASLA Biodiversity & Climate Action</u> **101 for Landscape Architects,"** which is free for all ASLA members. These webinars, held monthly from February to October, delve into topics such as Material Selection for Low Carbon Design, Urban Ecology, and Biodiversity Metrics. In case you miss any session, the webinars are being recorded for later viewing.

CCASLA UPDATE NEW NONFUNCTIONAL TURF DESIGN LAW

HOAs are required to stop using potable water to irrigate nonfunctional turf or to remove such turf from common areas by the end of 2028. Article by Kelly G. Richarson with the San Diego Union Tribune, February 27, 2024

The California Council of ASLA actively lobbied this issue when it appeared before the Water Parks and Wildlife Committee last year. The following is an article on the issue with the focus on impacts on Homeowner Associations.

Q: Can you address AB 1572, which will have a huge effect financially on our HOA?

A: Even though 2024 is expected to be a drought-free year, California is historically prone to periods of drought. On Oct. 13, 2023, the governor signed into law Assembly Bill 1572, creating a new Water Code Section 10608.14. (So now, in addition to Civil, Government, Corporations, and Vehicle Codes, there are also Water Code sections specifically affecting HOAs.)

This new statute requires various property owners, including common interest development associations, to remove "nonfunctional turf" or irrigate it with reclaimed water. HOAs are required to stop using potable water to irrigate nonfunctional turf or to remove such turf from common areas by the end of 2028. "Nonfunctional turf" is defined by Water Code Section 10608.12 as "turf that is not functional turf." "Functional turf" is defined as "a ground cover surface of turf located in a recreational use area or community space. Turf enclosed by fencing or other barriers to permanently preclude human access for recreation or assembly is not functional turf." "Turf" means a "ground cover surface of mowed grass." (Title 23 California Code of Regulations Section 491).

The law allows HOAs to use potable water to irrigate trees and other non-turf plantings. HOAs must achieve compliance with this new law by Jan. 1, 2029. However, given the aforementioned definitions, only mowed grass areas that are enclosed and not accessible to residents appear to be defined as "nonfunctional turf."

Therefore, most HOAs probably will not be greatly impacted. However, mowed grass areas that are purely decorative and not available for residents to enjoy appear to fall under this restriction, so HOAs should plan on supplying such areas with reclaimed water or simply removing any mowed turf from the location.

HOAs with over 5,000 square feet of irrigated common area must every three years provide a certification of compliance to the State Water Board. Thousands of HOAs have that much irrigated common area and will have to certify compliance, and the first certification is due on June 30, 2031.

The penalties for noncompliance are found in Water Code Section 1846, which provides for penalties of up to \$500 per day of violation. The state could also sue to enforce the law and collect the penalties.

While the law's goal of increasing potable water conservation is laudable, and although it won't substantially affect most HOAs, there is still the reporting requirement every three years to reckon with. Will the water board consider the failure to timely file a report to be a single \$500 violation, or will it consider each day to be a separate violation? Will the water board establish a form for these reports? Can they be submitted electronically? These are questions that remain to be sorted out in the coming years as the water board implements this statute.

If your HOA has more than 5,000 square feet of common area, the reporting deadline of June 30, 2031, should be calendared to avoid late filing.

Hopefully the impact on your HOA will not be as great as feared.
