# BAME CDC - 2016 \$5000 Community Grant Winner





# **Emerging Professionals Committee** Transitioning into 2016

In our last newsletter article. we introduced ADVANCE - the U.S. Green Building Council's new platform for bringing sustainable construction



and community building projects to underserved communities. Since then we have had 2 committee gatherings, a handful of LARE study sessions, and increasing interest and enthusiasm for committee participation.

Last year, we wrapped up our bi-monthly committee meetings with our second quest speaker--ASLA Fellow, Vicki Estrada--in a small group setting. Estrada Land Planning was a great host and provided insightful and inspirational information.

In mid-November, our committee was represented at the annual GreenBuild conference, held this year at the Washington DC Convention Center. Lectures and educational sessions included topics such as "Green Neighborhoods as Catalysts for Workforce Development" and "Under Our Own Power: Transforming Community Sustainability." The conference was the perfect transition into the coming months as we take on a leadership role in the implementation of ADVANCE.

On December 10, our committee formally present-

ed the ADVANCE platform to ASLA-SD, encouraging our professional members to be a part of the leading edge of the construction industry. ADVANCE is a nationwide movement to bring green building projects to low-income communities. There are currently 45 ambassadors around the country (one of which is our own ASLA Emerging Professionals Committee Chair, Kristen Koehrn) leading the charge in getting the new framework established from coast to coast. AD-VANCE will unlock the knowledge, experience, and benefits of sustainable development for low-income neighborhoods.

ADVANCE will be a huge part of what to look forward to with our committee in 2016. Working with the local San Diego USGBC Chapter has made it possible to launch two currently active ADVANCE (also locally known as the Green Assistance Program) projects. Designers like you who participate in the Jacobs Center Neighborhood Innovation and Jacobs & Cushman San Diego Food Bank projects will gain skills in sustainability management, green building practices, general project management, and leadership, USGBC-SD membership benefits for one year, and will benefit from preparation for a LEED Green Associate Credential. San Diego is also poised with two other projects to begin in 2016 at the Pacific Beach Taylor Library and the San Diego Salvation Army. # Update SD HALS Joy Lyndes, ASLA

The San Diego Chapter of the Historic American Landscapes Survey (SD HALS) was formed this year to promote the documentation, preservation, and knowledge of historic landscapes in San Diego. SD HALS invites a broad base of individuals and organizations who are knowledgeable and interested in cultural landscapes to join.

We are preparing a cultural landscapes database for San Diego County which will identify properties and master designers, identify threatened landscapes and provide a source of information to the profession. It will be available on our web site page/portal, coming soon on the ASLA SD Chapter website.

A goal for 2016 is to prepare two short form HALS documents: One on the Marston House Garden and the other a private residence. We are coordinating with Cuyamaca Community College for student interns to assist. We are also coordinating with the La Jolla Historical Society and the AIA Preservation Committee to co-sponsor events in 2016.

SD HALS will cover cultural landscapes ranging from prehistoric tribal through mid-century modern time periods, including designed, vernacular, historic, ethnographic and traditional cultural properties and a broad range of interests including natural and ornamental landscapes and cultural history. There are many local, state and national groups which provide knowledge, support and advocacy for San Diego cultural landscapes. We intend to foster partnerships with these organizations.

# Trustee's Report: Your Voice Does Count

This is a pitch to encourage you to become involved in lobbying your congressperson about critical issues that affect our profession. I. for one, have historically been reluctant to delve into this arena mainly,



I have to admit, because I thought I was too busy and it would involve too much work. Now, thanks to ASLA National and their Government Affairs staff, that excuse doesn't stand up. Through the "iAdvocate Network" (advocate.asla.org) set up by ASLA, it recently took me literally 3 minutes to weigh in on an important issue.

To illustrate how effective this can be, I recently received a request from ASLA to lobby my congressperson regarding a Senate Bill that would eliminate the "revegetation" portion of a national transportation program; landscape architects would no longer

be included in work that came out of funding for this transportation program. ASLA was able to summon the troops to fight this amendment, and as a result, the bill failed to pass. This was a direct consequence of ASLA members going to advocate.asla.org and flooding their Congressional reps with emails objecting to this bill.

Currently, another opportunity awaits to make a difference. As you may or may not know, Congress recently failed to reauthorize the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF). The LWCF was one of the most important federal programs in helping landscape architects design parks and outdoor recreation spaces. The LWCF expired on September 30, 2015, and Congress is still trying to work out a deal to reauthorize the program. It is critical that ASLA members continue to contact their legislators about reauthorizing LWCF. Use the iAdvocate Network to send a message about LWCF today!

I think once you have participated in the iAdvocate Network, and discover how easy it is, you will be empowered to join dedicated LAs in speaking up for our profession.

tions and are creating many opportunities for landscape architects to help educate the public on water conservation practices and/or otherwise engage their communities in recognizing the role landscape architects play in shaping the built environment. In fact, it is critical that our profession continue in this role as recent events have demonstrated. With the new water conservation mandates, there are many others who are more than willing to step in and take a lead. This has serious implications for our profession if we lose our place in this discussion.

A key area where the profession needs to continue focusing energy is professional competency. CCASLA again took a leading role in ushering through the legislature the Professions and Vocations: Licensing Boards Bill (AB 177) otherwise known as the Sunset Bill. Through public testimony, CCASLA and other industry representatives were able to explain to the legislature the importance of continuing professional licensure, thus continuing to support the measures to test for minimum professional competency and protecting the public health, safety, and welfare interests. A key piece of CCASLA's argument was, and remains, directly related to addressing the state's current water issues and how professional design services remain necessary. Questions related to what constitutes minimum professional competency (in regards to water conservation services) remain. The proactive attention of the profession in helping answer this question remains necessary if landscape architects are to continue remaining relevant.

legislative bills (Assembly Bill 1, AB 149, AB 1164), each designed to promote conservation of water in the landscape, or CCASLA's monitoring of the Independent Technical Panel, a legislatively-appointed group of academic, industry and quasi-governmental representatives assigned the task of providing information and recommendations to the Department of Water Resources and the Legislature on new demand management measures, technologies, and approaches to water use efficiency, landscape architects need to stay committed to helping find the solutions necessary to protect the state's water resources.




